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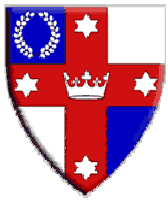
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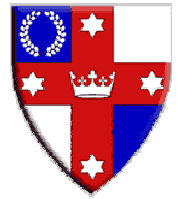

Their Excellencies Speak

From the Ramparts of Foxe Lodge

Unto the Populace of Southron Gaard & the College of St. Kessog,

This day Christopher & Clare, Baron & Baroness of Southron Gaard send courteous greetings.

Shortly after Coronation, Her Most Gracious Majesty, Constanzia, noted: "The opportunity for the populace to provide homage to the Crown is not common, so it appears to have fallen out of general knowledge" & that "many people simply do not understand what it is, and would have been delighted to have taken part when we provided the opportunity."

Whilst such an occurrence may very well have become commonplace on the Continent, Southron Gaard has a long history & proud tradition of swearing Fealty (Homage) to its reigning Monarchs. But, just so that everyone understands the Rights, Obligations (& Rewards) of doing so, We provide some general notes on the matter.

Fealty: a relationship between individuals, marked by an exchanged by oaths of service and protection.

The concept of Fealty is one of the most difficult and at the same time,

most alluring of the ideas that distinguish the Current Middle Ages from the modern world. The ceremonial exchange of oaths touches a strong chord in almost everyone drawn to the Society, but it can lead to difficult moments. Most of us manage to hold at one and same time the conflicting beliefs that—

- a) The social order of the Kingdom is "just a game" played out in the context of the democratic institutions of the Real World, and
- b) The value of ones personal word of honour must at all times be sacrosanct.

If you regard the oath of fealty as a bit of theatre to enhance court ceremony, you can find yourself swearing words you do n[o]t mean. If you take the oath seriously, you can find yourself swearing away rights the modern world says you ca n[o]t part with. However you enter into it, you may find yourself trapped in an unpalatable situation if the person to whom you [a]re bound—either as lord or as vassal—wants something you do n[o]t wish to give.

So be cautious. The vow is perilously similar to a marriage contract. It [i]s safe enough between the Crown ... and their servants because the jobs are fairly well defined and the royal power changes hands fairly often, but there is no role model or escape clause for anyone else.

Naturally, there is an expectation the Peerage & Landed Baronage will swear Fealty as a matter of course. At Canterbury Faire, should Their Majesties ask of the Populace if they too wish

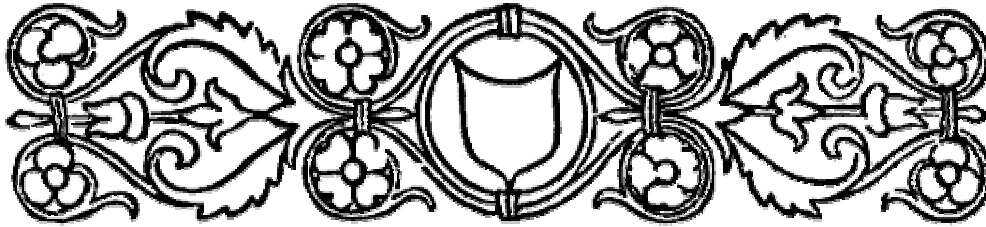
to swear, it is then up to each individual to examine their own conscience & to decide accordingly.

Seneschal's Comments

Amid the sturm and drang of there being less than two weeks to go to Faire, I don't have anything of use or significance to add, really. Still, to take up space in From the Tower, I'll write some stuff - all of it obvious. Firstly - don't stress. It's a holiday. It's not a Crown event. It's meant to be fun.

If you're not sure already, do bone up on heat stroke and heat exhaustion. Lady Lucia has written something on the topic which appears elsewhere in this issue. Take lots breaks, wear a hat, drink lots of water. if you're fighting, stop.

In recent addresses to the list on the topic of obstacles to participation, people have said they have had some encounters they regarded as standoffish or unfriendly. To our established populace - some newcomers are shy but would like to make friends. If you pass someone you don't know, a hello and eye contact may make a big difference. If they're carrying

something bulky or heavy, offer a hand. If, on any of the occasions where there are gatherings, you see someone standing by themselves and looking hesitant, try an introduction.

At the same time, I would suggest to newcomers that if people don't seem to be paying attention to you, they might be shy themselves. Or engrossed in conversation with friends they haven't seen in months or since last Faire.

Also - and this is more to newcomers or visitors from elsewhere - cooking, particularly for feasts, may be some of the most stressful and demanding service that people can render to the Society. They aren't the rock stars of the SCA that big tourney winners and costumers may be, but they can be key to the regard in which an event is held. To do it well, the cooks need accurate information given in a timely fashion, and adequate helpers to do what can be a lot of boring

spade work so they can do the fiddly stuff. And the minimum of botherment, particularly about non-immediately important stuff, once they're in the kitchen doing their thing.

So - if you're on the meal plan doing kitchen chores, make sure you turn up! The meal plan will need a certain number every day - we want to avoid situations where some days are overstaffed, and others are short. if you're prepared to be flexible regarding when you do the chores, that would be fab. And, if you don't need to be in the kitchen - if you're not cooking or washing or serving - don't go there. That sounds mean, but it's good diplomacy and will make everyone have a more laid-back, happy event.

Canterbury Faire – Important Information

TIMETABLE - The A&S timetable is now available and the main schedule has been updated and tweaked a little.

MATTRESSES - Mattresses will be available to campers again this year for \$1 per night or \$5 for the event. Contact Lord Raffe at cfbooking@sg.sca.org.nz to book yours.

GATE - The faire Gate House will be located in the Mangy Mongol (or in the Training Centre lounge if wet) and will be open for much of the setup weekend from 1pm on Saturday. During the week it will be open every day at 11-12 & 5-6, but if you're arriving outside of gate hours the Day Steward will be happy to sign you in.

ENTRY TO SITE - As in previous years the Entry Gate will be open on setup and packup days but locked during the event so please use the Postern Gate (see site map) for exit and re-entry during the week. PLEASE NOTE - this year the Postern gate to the car park and site will be locked for security reasons at 5pm each night during the event. The combination is **1 6 0 0** and a reminder will be posted at the Mangy Mongol. Please remember to lock the gate behind you. We are required to have an accurate number of people on site at all times so check out if you are going to leave for an extended period of time.

RUBBISH - We have confirmed with the site operators that glass may be left on site and does not need to be taken home with you. Glass must be separated from other rubbish and placed in the Glass Only containers as it is disposed of differently to other rubbish. Alcohol containers are allowed to be left on site like all other rubbish.

CHILDREN-The schedule and list of children's activities is provided below

MARKET- As space in the hall is limited please contact our market coordinator Lord Bjorn at n-richens@hotmail.com if you'd like to book table space. Those who are willing to set up just outside among the eager crowds are encouraged to do so. This year in addition to the main market on Tuesday there will also be an informal mini-market at the Mangy Mongol on Saturday from 2-3. It'll be an opportunity to sell those wares you still had after the market or perhaps that you've crafted during the event or just to do more shopping! If you could contact Lord Bjorn during faire if you intend to display items it would be help us know how many tables to set up. There will also be a merchanting tent available for use by itinerant vendors throughout faire by the Mangy Mongol. Lord Bjorn will be happy to book you some time to sell your wares.

DAY TRIPPERS – are welcome. \$10 for adult and \$5 for children (plus \$2 for non-members)



Canterbury Faire Fire Information

This is the official fire policy for Canterbury Faire 2011. If you have any questions about anything fire-related at Canterbury Faire, please contact the fire marshal – Angele Marie de Savigny (Kerry McSaveney) – seraphim@orcon.net.nz. Angele will liaise with the appropriate fire authorities before & during the event.

FIRE SEASON : The Waipara Boys Brigade Camp is located within a 1km fire safety margin of Department of Conservation land therefore DOC will decide what Fire Season applies in their areas.

Current Fire Season (as at 12 January 2010): Restricted

CALL 111: In the event of an out-of-control fire, call 111. Ask for the Fire Service. State your location - Waipara Boys Brigade Camp, 137 Darnley Road, off Georges Road, Waipara State what kind of fire – vegetation (grass etc) or building (kitchen etc). Then let the fire marshal know for liaison purposes.

GENERAL : Event rules require each occupied tent to have fire-fighting materials (fire extinguisher or bucket of sand or water) close at hand, regardless of whether there are BBQs, or candles, or campfires being used nearby. The fire extinguisher in your tent may be needed to save someone else's. Bunkroom heaters should not be used to dry clothing, etc.

BARBEQUES: Gas barbecues, and gas or liquid-fuelled cookers may be used regardless of the Fire Season. Charcoal barbecues must follow the same rules as campfires. Site rules require that barbecues are used in areas that have access to taps, on the concrete pads provided, or similar non-flammable ground cover.

SMOKING: Site rules state that smoking is prohibited in all buildings. Do not smoke near doorways. Use appropriate means of extinguishing cigarettes outside, and make sure your cigarette is fully extinguished before disposing of it in an appropriate receptacle. We have had ashtray fires in the past. During a Prohibited fire season please smoke away from vegetation on non-grassed areas such as the road behind the Mangy Mongol.

CANDLES, LANTERNS AND TIKI TORCHES: Site rules state that candles must be enclosed in lanterns, and not left unattended. Gas lanterns are permitted. Tiki torches are prohibited.

CAMPFIRES AND BRAZIERS: Department of Conservation rules state that campfires, including charcoal barbecues, (and braziers, and forges) must not be lit during a Prohibited Fire Season. If we are fortunate enough to have a Restricted Fire Season, campfires may be lit with the following restrictions:

- The fire must be sited at least three metres away from any tree, other vegetation, or structure (or tent).
- The fire must not be sited under any overhanging vegetation
- Firewood must be stored at least three metres away from the fire
- The ground surface must be cleared of all combustible materials within three metres of the fire
- Fires lit on the ground must have a stone (or concrete, or brick, or earth) surround
- The fire must not be lit when wind or other factors may cause it to escape

There must be some method of extinguishing the fire close at hand. Campfires should not be left unattended while burning. Extinguish them fully before going to bed. The fire doesn't have to have someone staring at it constantly to be attended. Ashes & coals must be disposed of carefully when completely cold.

CLAY OVEN: The clay oven may be used regardless of the Fire Season as it is not an open fire. There must be some method of extinguishing the fire close at hand and the oven should not be left unattended while in use.

Etiquette of Camping

The etiquette of camping in the SCA is one of those delicate topics that can cause offence when raised and absolutely ruin an event when ignored. Generally it is simply a matter of common sense and remembering the ideals of chivalry and courtesy while going about your business. The following Golden Rules of SCA Camping Etiquette are followed throughout the Known World.

1. Never enter a tent or encampment uninvited.

While onsite a person's tent, bunkroom or encampment is their home. Don't wander through on your way elsewhere and use only the designated entrances. Simply call "hello the camp" (or knock or ring the bell) to establish if anyone is home and receiving visitors. (Remember, there are some things you don't want to walk in on!)

2. Never sit in someone else's chair uninvited.

If you do end up taking someone's seat, always vacate it when the owner returns. They have lugged this comfort to site so don't deny them the use of it. This is especially true of fighters. (Also, they are heavy, smelly and have limited vision if they haven't taken their helm off. Stay seated at your peril.)

3. Tents are only made of canvas.

Always remember that tents do not muffle noise and private discussions can be heard clearly for some distance. In a similar vein, keep your noise down in 'residential' areas. (Also remember that tents can conspire with lighting to make you the unwitting star of an entertaining shadow play for your neighbours.)

4. Always leave space between tents.

While this is primarily a fire safety issue, it is also one of privacy—for you and for them. (We refer you to rule #3, and the concept of things you don't want to know.)

5. Don't block other campers.

Avoid setting up between an encampment (or tent) and an arterial route without the agreement of the established campers. (Nothing wrecks a night faster than someone tripping over your ropes and falling through your tent as they sleepily make their way to the loo.)

6. Keep the 'mundanities' to a minimum.

For example, hide your camera when it's not in use, keep your laptop in your tent, turn your cell phone off (if you can) and put your sunglasses away after dark.

7. Be kind with lighting

Avoid flashing your torch in people's faces and remember that one seriously bright lamp can wreck the ambience of several encampments. Limit their use to set up/take down and inside tents if possible. (Don't forget rule #3 if you choose to use them. Trust me.)

8. Meal times are sacred.

It may often seem like meal times are the only times that stewards and officers can be tracked down, but unless it is an emergency, allow them to eat in peace. It may be the only time-off they get all day. (Also, a 20 minute delay is usually preferable to a frazzled officer with low blood-sugar.)

9. Pick up after yourself.

No only will other attendees appreciate not falling over your stuff during the event but this is by far the best way to keep track of your belongings. (Nothing is more annoying than wandering around the whole site looking for some small and obscure (but vitally important) do-dah just before fighting begins.)

10. Leave the site tidier than you found it.

This is an SCA tradition, and one we take seriously. Once you have packed up your gear, do a grid-search of your encampment picking up all the rubbish before disposing of it properly.

11. No means NO

This really isn't that hard to understand and applies in numerous situations.

Of course there are plenty of other guidelines and rules that different groups (baronies, shires, households etc) follow in order to make camping more pleasant, but these 11 Golden Rules will stand you in good stead anywhere in the Known World.

Staying Healthy at Canterbury Faire

It's the most anticipated event of the Southron Gaard calendar- Canterbury Faire! It's a time of fun, catching up with old friends, meeting new ones, and most of all making great memories to fill in the months until the next CF. Unfortunately, it's also held during some of the most garb-unfriendly weather that the Canterbury Plains have to offer, and when you're busy trying to enjoy yourself, it's easy to neglect the signals your body sends as its early warning system.

With that in mind, here are some SCA friendly tips using the SunSmart formula, for making the most out of CF while caring for your most important asset – YOU!

1) **Slip-** This is not an appropriate time to wander around in shorts and a singlet, so take the time now to go through your garb wardrobe and chose suitable fashions/fabrics for the weather you are likely to encounter. Natural fibres allow your skin to breathe, meaning that heat is allowed to escape through the fibre and isn't trapped against you generating even more heat. Now that you've thought about the heat- think about a garment or cloak for the night- we all know it can get chilly during the night, and you don't want to freeze during your 1:30am run to the loo!

2) **Slop-** Put sunscreen on that packing list! However packing it is not enough- WEAR it for your best advantage. Remember to follow the directions on the package for when to reapply (normally every 2 hours) - it's not designed to protect all day!

3) **Slap-** Head coverings are a great idea and suit all different personas and periods. It protects from the sun, and is one of the easiest things to wear that adds to a more 'authentic' appearance. A wide brimmed straw hat is

relatively cheap to purchase, and will save you from hours from pain from roasting in the sun!

The self-care doesn't end there, however! It's easy to ignore the little things while we're busy, but little things have a habit of becoming large things that can't be ignored!

1) **Rest** is required for your body to repair itself from everything we put it through. If we're busy with heavy fighting, archery, rapier, etc., and try to stay up all night in the Mong sooner or later it will catch up in the form of exhaustion. Try to get sufficient sleep, and balance all those activities that you want to do!

2) **Intake-** remember to eat regular meals. Your body needs fuel to run. We put petrol in our vehicles; our bodies work in a similar way. Water is also crucially important- an adult should drink a minimum of 2 litres in a normal situation- more when it is hot or when doing physical activity! An easy test to tell if you've been drinking enough is to think about how long it's been since visiting the loo. If you are dehydrated, you do not use the facilities. Remember that your fluid intake should be water or a sports drink; alcohol compounds the dehydration!

3) **Listen to your body-** if you feel a bit off, let someone know. Take a break; have a rest. Pushing yourself further does you no good, and is a disservice to others.

Since we all know a certain road is paved with good intentions, here's what to do when it all goes wrong:

Heat Issues Immediately get yourself or the individual to the shade. Ask for help; get a surgeon. If there is profuse sweating,

loosen/remove clothing. Sipping water slowly whilst applying cold packs to the underarms, groin and back of the neck will help to cool down the body. Take care not to overcool.

If there is no sweating present, this is a sign of a more serious condition- do not delay treatment and do not be afraid to ring 111 for professional emergency services. Remove as much clothing as possible and begin cooling down the body with cold packs and pouring water over the body. Do not give water to drink. In these situations, try to respect the dignity and modesty of the individual as much as possible, but their care is the first priority.

Bruises - It's all fun and games until someone gets hurt! With the amount of physical contact occurring in heavy fighting, people are bound to get bumps and bruises. Remember that these too should be treated. For swelling and bruises apply cold packs to the affected area-remembering the word "RICE" will help remember what to do for swelling:

Rest

Ice

Compress

Elevate

General First Aid - Not everyone is trained in first aid, but everyone can remember some basics to get you through any scenario, no matter if it's a small scrape or a major disaster. The term "DR'S ABC" is used in first aid training to help remember how to deal with any situation.

Danger- Ensure your safety before entering the scene. You aren't helping anyone if you injure yourself too!

Response- Is the victim conscious? If they appear unconscious, use the back of your hand to tap their shoulder and in a loud voice, ask if they are ok and introduce yourself (and any first aid training you have)

Send for help- Get help as soon as possible.

At Canterbury Faire, there is normally someone always within earshot. Never be timid in asking for assistance!

Airway- Is there something blocking the airway? Believe it or not, the tongue is normally the culprit in blocking the airway in an unconscious person. Kneel at their side, and using your hand closest to their forehead, place it palm down on their forehead and apply firm, backwards pressure. This will cause their head to tilt back. With your other hand, take your first two fingers and place them on the bony part of the person's chin. Lift their chin with your fingertips; this will put their airway in a neutral position and prevent blockage by the tongue.

Breathing- Continuing to maintain the head-tilt/chin-lift described above, check to see if the person is breathing. Look for the rise and fall of their chest, listen for breathing, and feel for their exhaled breaths against your cheek. If no breathing is present, then prepare to begin CPR.

Circulation- Check for any noticeable signs of bleeding. Deal with these only if the patient is breathing!

CPR is a useful lifesaving skill that everyone should know. Whilst it is easily described as giving 30 chest compressions and 2 breaths in a continued cycle, proper training and refreshers can provide the confidence that you are correctly doing the prescribed technique depending on whether the patient is an infant, child, or adult. For further training, enquire with a first aid training organisation or instructor.

They say that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure- so think about your daily activities at Canterbury Faire and think about your self-care; remembering little things like sunscreen, medicines, and taking it easy will make your CF more enjoyable and a better one to remember!

Mind your Manners

There are all these seats in the marquee – can I use them?

This depends on which seat you wish to use. You must not, for example, sit on the Thrones. It is also extremely bad form to use someone's personal chair without their express permission. Even if the chair is left unattended, it is not available for your use. Indeed, very little is more vexing than taking a chair to site, leaving it unattended in the marquee for the duration of a war scenario or class etc and returning to discover it has been damaged (or broken) in your absence requiring you to forfeit its comfort for the rest of the event. However, hay bales and seats that belong to the venue are usually available for general use, although do consider that it would be exceedingly churlish to occupy a chair that someone else has just lugged down from the hall, unless, of course, they transported it for you.

How do I identify whether or not a chair belongs to someone?

We will assume you can recognise the Thrones and concentrate on personal seating. Generally speaking, anything that is not a hay bale or a seat belonging to the venue is probably personal property. Many people bring some form of seating (e.g. director's or steamer chairs, wooden benches, even resin chairs etc) to Faire in order to make their event more comfortable. Some people even decorate them (perhaps with their arms, heraldic colours, or just a coat of paint or fabric cover) to better differentiate them. It is safest to assume that odd chairs, unique

benches or small numbers of (semi)matching seats, are personal property and thus should not be used without permission.

What is a household?

A household is an unofficial group of people within the SCA. The household may comprise of a Peer and their partner and associates, a group of people who participate in the same activities, individuals with a shared persona interests, or just a group of friends who like to share the camping workload etc. These groups run the gamut from highly researched & rigidly structured recreations of period households to loose, ever-changing conglomerations of friends and acquaintances. The members might camp together, or they might not. Membership might be limited to people from one shire, or might span Kingdoms. It is virtually entirely up to the household to define itself.

Can I start a household?

Yes.

What is the etiquette for visiting household encampments?

That depends very much on the household, and possibly also your relationship to them. Announcing your presence at the encampment entrance will usually gain you an invitation to enter and visit with them for a time. Do keep in mind that guests around meal times can be problematic, so it is generally considered polite to excuse yourself when meal preparation gets underway.

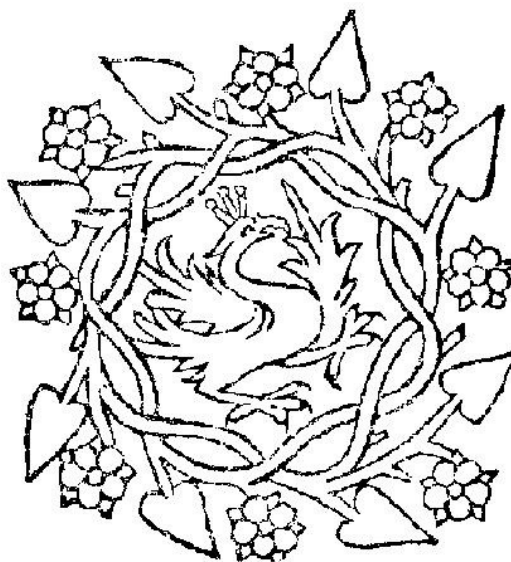

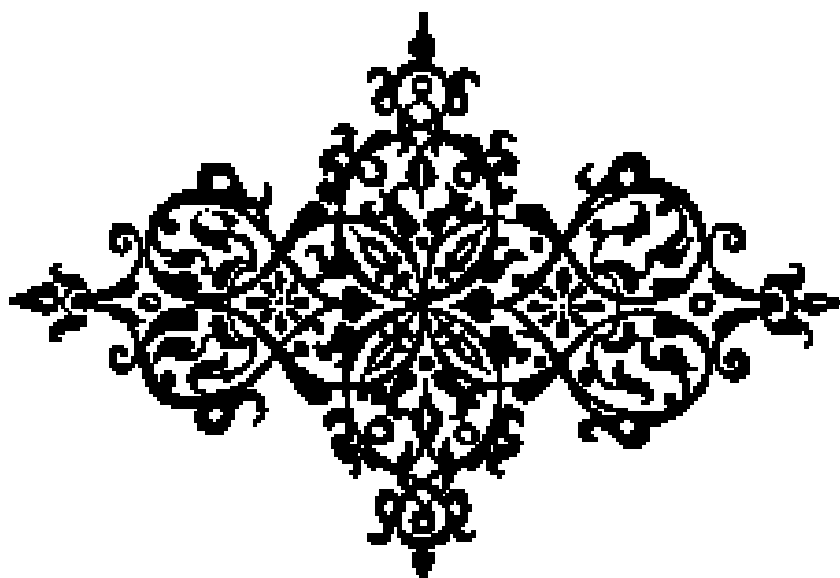
